Funding FAQs

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Early years funding

Please note that these FAQs should be read alongside the full Luton Provider Agreement.

What is early years funding?

As at January 2024, the government provides early years entitlements for all 3 and 4 year old children, and some disadvantaged 2 year olds to attend early years provision for 570 hours per year. Some working parents of 3 and 4 year olds are entitled to 1140 hours per year (30 hours a week term time).

An expansion of early years entitlements is taking place in three phases:

Phase 1: April 2024 - 15 hours of childcare over 38 weeks of the year made available to eligible working parents of **two year olds**

Phase 2: September 2024 - 15 hours of childcare over 38 weeks of the year made available to eligible working parents of **9 month to 36 month olds**

Phase 3: September 2025 - 30 hours of childcare over 38 weeks of the year made available to eligible working parents of **9 month to 36 month olds**

How much am I paid for providing early years funded childcare?

Funding rates from September 2023 are as follows:

- hourly rate for 3 and 4 year olds £5.17
- hourly rate for 2 year olds £7.54

From April 2024 the rates will be:

- hourly rate for 3 and 4 year olds £5.43
- hourly rate for disadvantaged 2 year olds £8.15
- hourly rate for working parents of two year olds £7.97

From September 2024

• hourly rate for working parents of 9 month to two year olds - £11.05

Do I need to meet criteria to become an early years provider?

If you have already been inspected by Ofsted, you will need to be judged 'Good' or 'Outstanding' by Ofsted to receive early years funding for 2, 3 and 4 year old children. If you are a new provider registered with Ofsted, but have not yet been inspected, you will be able to take up funded children after you register your interest with Luton Council. Your continuity of service provided to funded children depends on your first full Ofsted inspection judgement.



Luton Council will fund places at a childminder registered with an agency judged 'effective' or until the agency's first full Ofsted inspection judgement is published.

What do I need to do to deliver early years funding? To offer funding you must:

- be registered with the Secretary of State, Ofsted or a childminding agency
- agree to comply with the current Luton Provider Agreement
- be aware that the funding is claimed via an online portal; therefore, access to a tablet or private computer is required
- be aware that you will need to use Egress switch, the secure email solution that the council uses for email communication for personal and sensitive information https://switch.egress.com/ui/registration/accountcreate.aspx

How do I register?

Please register your interest by emailing <u>nursery.headcount@luton.gov.uk</u>. You will then receive an email with the relevant documents along with a copy of the Luton Council Provider Agreement.

The Provider Agreement will need to be signed, returned and accepted by Luton Council before you can start to deliver early years funding.

I have received an 'inadequate' or 'requires improvement', Ofsted judgement, or my childminder agency has been graded as 'ineffective' what happens now?

Please notify the team as soon as possible so that support can be arranged. No action will be taken until the report has been published. Please see the Luton Council Provider Agreement for further information.

How many weeks does Luton Council fund per year?

Term time only, which equals to 38 weeks per year and is spilt over three terms:

- summer 13 weeks
- autumn 14 weeks
- spring 11 weeks

How is the funding calculated?

Early entitlement funding for each term is initially calculated based on an estimate submission.

You will receive two payments per term:

- **First Payment (75%)** based on the indicative budget or a forecast task at the beginning of the term.

- **Second Payment (balance of actual headcount)** based on your actual headcount submission for the term minus first payment received.



It is essential that providers submit actual headcount returns via the EYES Establishment Portal by the required deadlines.

We are planning to move to a monthly payment schedule when practical.

When can a disadvantaged 2-year-old access their funded entitlement?

Eligible disadvantaged 2-year-olds can claim funding from the term after their second birthday or from the date of their eligible application, whichever is later.

When can a 3 or 4-year-old access their universal (15 hours) funded entitlement?

All 3 and 4-yearold children can claim funding from the term after their third birthday.

When can a child access their extended entitlement?

For extended childcare funding (15 or 30 hours funding), the funding starts from the term after the child turns the required age or when their parents receive their eligibility code from HMRC, whichever is later (subject to termly deadlines).

At which age is the child no longer eligible for early years funding? Once the child has reached compulsory school age (the term following their fifth birthday) or once they have taken a place in a reception class in a school.

How long do I need to retain early years documentation?

You are required to retain paperwork for the current financial year plus six previous years. Also, please consider the requirements of your Liability Insurance as well as the above.

Are providers allowed to charge a 'top-up fee'?

No, providers are not allowed to charge parents the difference between the hourly rate funded by the local authority and the amount they usually charge per hour.

Can funding be backdated?

No, you need to ensure you claim all the funding within the correct term as Luton Council cannot back date funding to previous terms once they are closed.

I have accepted a child after headcount date; do I receive funding?

No. However, as disadvantaged two year olds can start at any time in the term, funding can be claimed as long as the child does not start in the last two weeks of term – please contact <u>nursery.headcount@luton.gov.uk</u>

Universal or extended hours can only be claimed if a child is moving into the local authority area as funding is based on the headcount week.



Providers can write a business case if they have taken on more children which may have noticeable financial impact on their business operation for Luton Council to evaluate as a special case.

I have opened part way through the term; do I receive funding for the full term?

No, you will receive funding for the number of weeks open, the number of children on roll and their funded hours.

How many times a year will a provider have to verify a parents' 30 hour eligibility code?

The eligibility code only needs to be verified by the provider once, when the parent initially comes into the setting and presents the code. After this, it is the parents' responsibility to re-validate their code with HMRC when they are notified via emails/texts from HMRC and inform providers immediately of the outcome.

Providers should regularly check to support parents to keep their code eligible and notify them if they fall in to their grace period. Luton Council provides information on the portal for providers to support their families and check if any codes are due for renewal.

Are children eligible to start with a new provider in their grace period?

No, parents cannot start their children at a new setting within their grace period, but they are able to continue in their place with their current provider until the end of the grace period.

Can providers share funding?

Parents may split their funding between multiple providers, though no more than two sites in one day and must not exceed the entitlement.

It is the parents' responsibility to clearly indicate details of all providers on the Parental Declaration Form and specify where they want the hours to be claimed. However, continuity of care is important for the child, therefore consideration should be given to the impact that multiple providers may have on a child's learning, development and wellbeing.

Can a parent stretch the funding over more than 38 weeks?

Yes, parents can agree with their provider to take fewer hours over more weeks, for example 11.4 hours over 50 weeks (universal entitlement) or 22.8 hours over 50 weeks (extended 30 hour entitlement). Invoices must clearly show how the entitlement is being delivered as claims may be audited at any time.



What is Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP)?

EYPP is an additional £0.68 (from April 2024) per hour of universal funding to support eligible children's early education. If a child is eligible, the childcare provider or school that the child attends can receive EYPP to help support and improve the child's individual learning.

Providers must enter the child's carer's details including date of birth and NI number to allow EYPP eligibility to be checked on the portal and obtain consent from the parents.

What is Disability access fund (DAF)?

If you provide a funded place for a child who receives <u>disability living allowance</u> (<u>DLA</u>), your setting may be eligible to receive <u>disability access funding</u>, which is £910 (from April 2024) per child per year.

Can a child receive funding whilst waiting to start school?

No, once a child is on the register for a school, even if only part time or waiting for a staggered start, they cannot use early years funding.
