When I left school I wasn't sure about what I wanted to do. I didn't hear anything about Apprenticeships when I was at school. I then went on and studied Electrical Installation at College for a year but I wasn't really enjoying it. I then worked in a warehouse, spent a year doing odd-jobs, went back to College to study PC maintenance and then worked in Retail.

I'm 26 now and I'm glad to say I'm settled with Vauxhall. My dad also works for Vauxhall and told me what a great company they are and the range of career opportunities. I decided to apply and I'm really glad that I did. It sometimes feels a bit strange being at College when almost everyone else is younger than me, but no one really notices!

A typical day for me starts with cycling or walking into work for about 7:15am. There is a signal to work which is like an alarm and we need to be at our work stations ready to start at 7:30am. It makes you really disciplined and means that everyone starts work at the same time. We have alarms for lunch and also for the end of the day. I finish at 6 minutes past 3:00pm. It sounds like a strange time to finish - but it's calculated by our breaks and work hours. Although we start early, we also finish early, which is great!
