

Luton Ending Adult Exploitation Business & Performance Plan

Version 1 – January 2018

Context:

Luton has a zero tolerance approach to the exploitation of adults. Our Eliminating Adult Exploitation Strategy sets out strategic approach to this issue of which we hold the ultimate vision of eliminating this unacceptable criminal conduct from our Town. This vision and strategy is shared by the Community Safety Partnership, Luton Adult Safeguarding Board and the Health & Wellbeing Board.

This business & performance plan is a live document which captures the key action areas which will be undertaken to address the three key strategic areas which are set out in the chart below – alongside our desired outcomes and performance measures.
